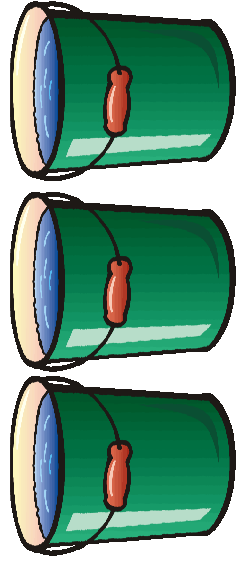


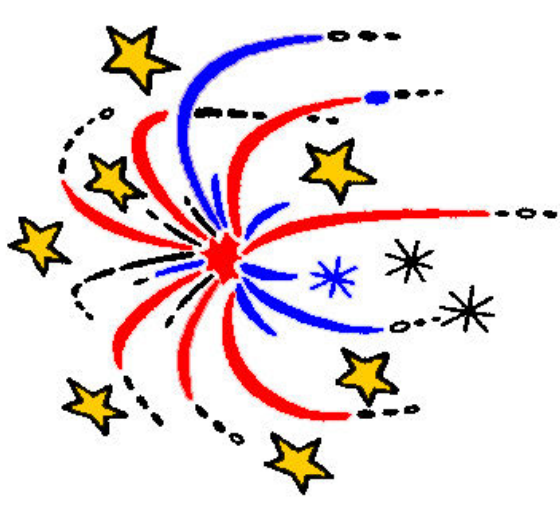
Fireworks Facts

- Every year fireworks cause fires and burns.
- The woods are full of excess fuel. This year especially we are in danger of fireworks-related fires.
- The Safest, Most Patriotic, Most Adult, Best Thing to Do is to **NOT USE FIREWORKS.** Instead, go to a public fireworks display.
- **IF YOU MUST USE FIREWORKS ANYWAY,** take extra care to teach your children about fireworks safety.
- **KEEP PLENTY OF BUCKETS OF WATER HANDY.**

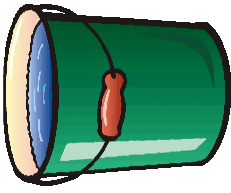

Safety Guidelines

- **First, read the directions** on each device before using. Study these guidelines.



- **Keep plenty of water buckets of water handy.** Soak used fireworks 6 hours in water before discarding.

- **Choose a fireworks operator:**

Good: Use only by responsible adults and older children under close adult supervision.

Better: Use only by a responsible adult wearing sturdy cotton clothing covering arms, body, and legs.

Best: Watch a Professional Fireworks Display.

- **Choose a safe place outdoors.**

Aerial: Aerial fireworks such as rockets: bare flat circle at least 100 feet across.

Non-aerial: bare flat circle 30 feet across.

Fireworks should only be ignited outdoors and away from animals, small children, grass, trees, buildings, storage tanks, brush or combustible materials.

- **No alcohol. No polyester or nylon clothing.** These are not safe with fireworks.

- **Keep fireworks away from small children. Even sparklers can burn at 2000 degrees F.**

THE WOODS ARE DRY. BE RESPONSIBLE

- **Store fireworks in a cool dry place** away from heat and flames.

- **Fireworks should not be allowed to become wet** and should not be used when dried after becoming wet.

- **Do not carry fireworks** in your pocket or on your person.

- **No smoking, no flames.** Lit cigarettes, cigars, pipes or open flames should be kept away from fireworks.

- **Never ignite fireworks inside another container,** such as inside a bottle or can.

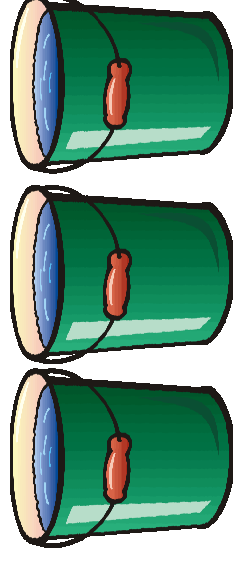
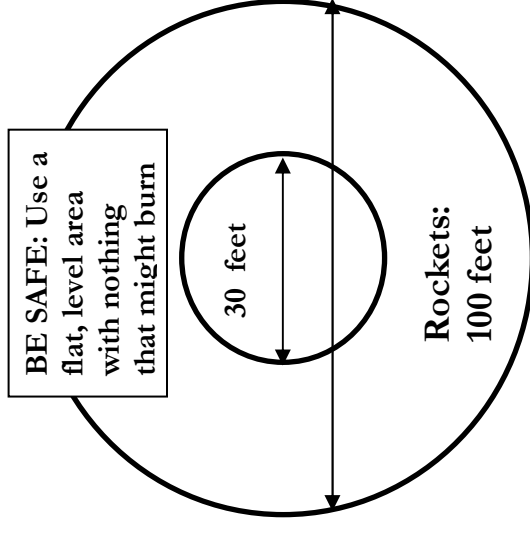
- **Use eye protection.** Loss of vision is a frequent result of fireworks accidents. Never throw fireworks or aim them at another person, animal or building.

- **Only light one firework device at a time,** then move away from the device quickly. Keep clear of any device that has been ignited, but has yet to go off.

- **Do not touch duds. Soak duds in water** before handling. **Never relight duds.**

- **Never experiment with fireworks** in any way (a strong federal prohibition exists for such activity).

- **Do not stand or lean over the firework device when lighting.**
